As I prepare to leave, I find myself looking for those markers of success: students who speak better English, a more developed church community, quantifiable increases in agricultural yields or nutritional intake. But as I reflect, I'm finding these markers don't exist - at least not in the ways I'd have originally expected. Instead of seeing end marks,
